## DIFFERENT GENERATIONS



A couple of news items caught my attention this week. The first was a survey which showed that up to a considerable number of young people feel their 'spendthrift' parents are being selfish as they indulge in holidays without considering their children's or grandchildren's economic wellbeing. And, apparently, it makes their "blood boil" as two in five millennials fear their parents are frittering away their inheritance. [A reverse of the parable of the Prodigal Son!] However, it seems that younger people need not worry as $60 \%$ of the over- 65 s who were surveyed said they were scrimping to save for their children and grandchildren. Nearly $80 \%$ of older people planned to leave everything to their children. It is fascinating how perceptions vary - along generational lines.
The second report I read concerned the spiraling numbers of people in this country who are described as 'economically inactive'. These are people who are of working age but neither employed nor looking for a job. After Covid quite a few older people decided to call time and retire but this statistic is not about them. The Office for National Statistics says that more than a fifth of the UK's potential workforce have dropped out of the employment market. This equates to 9.25 million people, a rise of 700,000 since the pandemic. Even more alarming, when the figures are broken down, is that in the past year there has been a rise of 248,000 of economically inactive young people in the $16-24$ age group. Their total is now close to 3 million. There are many factors involved but one which keeps cropping up is poor mental health.
Work (which is not necessarily the same as employment) is an essential part of being human. It leads to people feeling valued whether paid or voluntary. It gives us one reason to get out of bed in the morning. It brings us in contact with others and should produce a sense of achievement - that we are making a difference. In many cases it leads to some freedom as we have our own money to spend or save. For so many young adults this is not happening and, I suspect, this will lead to greater problems in the future in the whole sphere of mental health. Having purpose, setting goals, developing plans, all are important to who we are. Perhaps a first big step for those of us who are well past the stage of setting out on the journey of life is simply to try and understand what's going on amongst those who are much younger. We may not be able to put ourselves in their shoes, but do we really have much of a clue about what they are facing? Do we talk with them, and do we ask?

SAINT JOSEPH The Solemnity of St Joseph is celebrated on 19th March. In his Apostolic Letter entitled Patris Corde ("With a Father's Heart") written in 2020, Pope Francis describes Saint Joseph as a beloved father, a tender and loving father, an obedient father, an accepting father; a father who is creatively courageous, a working father, a father in the shadows.
Pope Francis also notes how, "Every day, for over forty years, following Lauds [Morning Prayer]" he has "recited a prayer to Saint Joseph taken from a nineteenth-century French prayer book of the Congregation of the Sisters of Jesus and Mary." This prayer, he says, expresses devotion and trust, and even poses a certain challenge to Saint Joseph," on account of its closing words: "My beloved father, all my trust is in you. Let it not be said that I invoked you in vain, and since you can do everything with Jesus and Mary, show me that your goodness is as great as your power."
At the end of his Letter, he adds another prayer to St Joseph, which he encourages all of us to pray together:
Hail, Guardian of the Redeemer, Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary.
To you God entrusted his only Son; in you Mary placed her trust; with you Christ became man.
Blessed Joseph, to us too, show yourself a father and guide us in the path of life.
Obtain for us grace, mercy, and courage, and defend us from every evil. Amen.
