Habemus Papam - we have a Pope!

On Thursday evening, hundreds of millions of people around the world watched the pictures from Rome as we waited to hear who had been elected as the 267th Successor of St Peter. Then, about an hour after white smoke had appeared from the chimney above the Sistine Chapel, Pope Leo XIV came out onto the balcony - and smiled. That struck me immediately, even before he had uttered a word. It doesn't matter how much experience an individual has, that moment of walking onto the balcony and hearing the sound of the hundreds of thousands of people gathered in the square and along the Via Conciliazione must be awesome.

Immediately the Commentators were busy considering Cardinal Robert Prevost's journey to this point. There were observations about how short the Conclave was, the fact that the new Pope was born in Chicago, and that he spent many years working in Peru. The fact that the Cardinals came to a decision relatively quickly is interpreted as a show of unity amongst them about the qualities needed in the man taking on the mantle from Pope Francis [no time for the machinations seen in the film 'Conclave' ...]. Pope Leo has worked in Rome for the past few years overseeing the appointment of Bishops, is a member of the Augustinian Order and is 69 years old. The direction in which Pope Francis was steering the Catholic Church seems likely to be followed by this Pope, although he will do this in his own

The choice of name is significant. The last Pope Leo concentrated on Social Teaching and is especially remembered for an Encyclical he wrote in 1891: *Rerum Novarum* (a title which can be translated as 'Revolutionary Change'). It addressed the condition of the working classes and the rights and duties of capital and labour. No Pope chooses his name on a whim: even now we can see that our new Pope is likely to speak out on issues of social justice

The election of a new Pope, who builds on the work of those who have gone before him, is an exciting moment in the life of the Church. The Bishop of Rome is a figure of unity. In every Mass that we celebrate at Corpus Christi Church we pray, in the Eucharistic Prayer, for Leo our Pope and Philip our Bishop. Its not just because they need the support of our prayers - which of course they do. But it is also a statement of Communion. We in the Diocese of Portsmouth are united in faith expressed as communion with our Bishop, a Successor of the Apostles. He in turn shows our unity in faith with the worldwide church through his communion with the Bishop of Rome, the Pope. Every five years or so, each Bishop makes a special visit to Rome (the ad limina) to demonstrate that communion.


In a world where divisions, splits and fracturing happen all too often, the Pope stands as a sign of hope that people can be brought together, united with a common purpose. As Pope Leo XIV begins ministry in his new role, let us pray for him and for the Church which Jesus established to serve the world without fear or favour. Father John

TODAY IS GOOD SHEPHERD SUNDAY "The fourth Sunday in Easter is referred to as Good Shepherd Sunday.. What is unique about Jesus, our Good Shepherd, is that He is the only Shepherd who also became a Lamb. St Paul reminds us in a beautiful hymn we find in his letter to the Philippians (2:6-11) that, though the Son of God is truly equal to the Father from all eternity, He emptied Himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. Being found in human form, He humbled Himself and became obedient to the point of death - even death on a cross. The Son of God became man. The Shepherd became a Lamb. When Jesus began His public ministry, He joined the cue of sinners who went down to the Jordan river to receive John's baptism of repentance. The sinless One joins the gueue of sinners.... This is the Good Shepherd we have. One who joins our ranks. One who walks among us sick and wounded sinners. One who gets down on His knees to wash our feet. One who goes to the point of shedding His blood to wash us clean of sin. Jesus refers to His disciples as those who hear His voice and follow Him. And what is His voice saying to us who listen? "I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you" (Jn 13:15). O Good Shepherd, who humbled yourself to become one of us and who shed your Blood to save us, help us to love and serve as you did."
